As a 21st Century Learning Center, St. Elizabeth Provides Robust Before/After School Programming

Families of St. Elizabeth Elementary School in Oakland enjoy the benefits of a vigorous before and after school program, thanks to a state funded 21st Century Community Learning Center grant administered by the University of California, Berkeley.

St. Elizabeth is one of six urban schools in the Diocese of Oakland that receives this grant. As a part of this collaborative, SEES receives over \$250,000 annually for their 21st Century Community Learning Center, which provides before school breakfast and activities from 6:30 to 8:00 am, and from 3:00 to 6:00 pm, tutoring, academic enrichment, digital education, free play and field trips. A total of 112 students are participating this year.

This is the seventh year that SEES has earned this grant. It's a prime example of the extra mile our schools are willing to go to support their students and families.

"When school is open, we're open," says Utami Setiyade, Director of the 21st Century program at St. Elizabeth. "We provide programs for our students during spring break and summer vacation and are also open a few Saturdays for special



events such as Soccer Fest, Robotic Competition and Cal Day."

The staff of 13 includes four SEES teachers and one UC student. An associate degree is required, and several have bachelor's degrees.

Academic enrichment encompasses STEEAAM offerings in Science, Technology, Engineering, Executive Functioning Skills, Athletics, Arts and Math. Students are involved with Mouse Squad (learning computers and coding) and Career & College Club. VEX Robotics is popular among third graders attending summer school.

Golf is offered in collaboration with The First Tee of East Bay, and street soccer sponsored by SS USA is available twice weekly.

"Our 21st Century program is a huge anchor for St. Elizabeth," says Principal Deline Easterday. Combined with the regular school day, "We serve

working families by providing quality programming for students from 6 am to 6 pm, and 21st Century targets 'summer loss' with academic classes and fun activities."

In addition to helping build English language skills, the curriculum covers six areas that are important to an immigrant family as they transition into life in the United States: Basic Living, Health & Wellness, Finance, Workplace, Education, Citizenship & Civic Responsibility.

Principal Anabel Rodriguez, who was trained by MATT to lead this program, says, "St. Michael's has a significant immigrant population, and I'm thrilled that we will be able to help our parents and community members become more familiar with the way our country works. My hope is it will help them to get better jobs, be active community members, and learn how to advocate for their children and themselves. I'm grateful to the Catholic Schools Collaborative for funding this program at our school."

The Catholic Schools Collaborative is funding the Maestro en Casa program at 11 Catholic elementary schools in the South Los Angeles area.



St. Ignatius of Loyola East Los Angeles

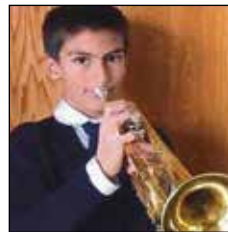

Sacred Heart Elementary East Los Angeles



Parents and teachers were all proud of the students' accomplishments and progress in learning their chosen instruments – guitar, clarinet, flute, trumpet or violin – at Sacred Heart's Winter Music Concert on December 6. It was testament to the students' hard work as they played Christmas carols for everyone's enjoyment.

Now in its third year, the school partners with the Young Musician's Foundation (YMF), which provides students in grades 4-8 the opportunity to play an instrument. Sacred Heart Principal, Sister Maria Elena Gutierrez, O.P., sees value in teaching the arts as well as the positive effect it has on students' overall academic learning.

Since the majority of families served by the school live at lower income levels, the program is only possible through the shared vision and generosity of donors.

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Seeking Support for Technology Initiative Schools Qualify for LMU Blended Learning Program

Vision of Hope's schools in San Francisco, St. Anthony-Immaculate Conception and St. James, have qualified as Blended Learning Partnership Schools by the Loyola Marymount University School of Education's iDEAL initiative (Innovation in Digital Education and Leadership). The full faculty of both schools will participate in the two-year program beginning with the 2017-2018 school year.

Gifts are now being sought to finance the blended learning program, which is estimated to cost \$400,000 over next three years, according to Vision of Hope Executive Director Ann Magovern.

Blended Learning is a term used to describe the way online learning is combined with traditional classroom methods and individualized instruction to create a new "blended" teaching methodology. It leverages the internet to afford each student a more personalized learning experience.

The LMU model is an opportunity for students to learn at their own pace, at their own level, through small group

instruction, individual and collaborative practice and using adaptive and assignable software. The program allows teachers to get immediate data on student learning and differentiate the learning in order to maximize student success.

To qualify for the LMU program, both schools had to exhibit readiness for the three pillars of Blended Learning Partnership Schools: leadership, culture and technology.

"This is a dramatic step forward for the academic programs at both schools," Magovern says. "Over the next 2-3 years, we are confident that we will see significant growth in the students' reading and math scores."

She adds, "This would not have been possible without the investment in technology infrastructure that Shea Family Charities made last year at both SAIC and St. James."

Vision of Hope's goal is to expand LMU's Blended Learning program to St. Elizabeth School, Oakland, in the fall of 2018 and to ensure that all eight Vision of Hope schools are integrating and utilizing technology to the fullest extent possible.
