St. Frances X. Cabrini

Sister Jane Marie prepared her students to ask Ann questions, including "What did you like

about teaching?" and "Are you rooting for the Warriors?" In turn, Ann asked students about their studies, families, and things they liked to do.

Ann has been involved with Vision of Hope since its early days 27 years ago. She has been a generous supporter of Vision of Hope and SAIC in a variety of ways. Annually she offers a \$1,000 scholarship to any SAIC graduate who is accepted to attend Riordan High School in San Francisco.

Ann's daughters, Angela, and Rose Stanfel, are also generous donors to both SAIC and Vision of Hope.

Like Ann, Mary Zant became a Class Angel this spring at St.

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Michael's in South Los Angeles and was paired with Mrs. Eliana Cruz's kindergarten class.

"It was important for me to visit the school and meet the kids



in person," Mary says. "I went right before Easter and took a plastic egg with seashells in it as an introduction to where I live near the beach. I was able to read a book to the kids, one that they knew well. It was delightful."

This was the first time Mary visited a Vision of Hope school and shared that "In the little time I was there, I saw how wonderful
